

In the face of the COVID-19 crisis, the European Commission's **top priority** is **safeguarding the health and well-being of its citizens**, using all the tools at its disposal.

The EC has taken a **multi-faceted approach**:

The EC set up an advisory panel on coronavirus composed of **seven expert epidemiologists and virologists** from EU Member States to formulate science-based EU **response** guidelines and **coordinate risk** management measures.

The **EU Solidarity for Health Initiative** was launched on 2 April, which is aimed at directly supporting the health care systems of EU Member States. It will provide for **€6 billion** to meet the needs of **European health systems**.

Ensuring **high-quality coronavirus testing** by adopting these guidelines:

-  Set standards for **testing kit quality**
-  Establish a **network of reference laboratories**
-  Fight against **counterfeit devices**
-  Coordinate **fair distribution of kits and devices**



An effective **crisis coordination strategy** that includes:



And allows for:

-  Rapid **exchange** of information
-  Extensive **monitoring**
-  **Coordination** of response measures

In addition, notifications of serious **cross-border health threats** are made through the Early Warning and Response System.

The Commission adopted **guidelines** to support Member States in need, with the following aims and provisions:

-  Arranging for patient **mobility across borders**
-  Facilitating **cross-border medical assistance**
-  **Relieving the burden** on national health systems
-  Steps for the **reimbursement** of healthcare costs
-  Encouraging the use of **bilateral/regional agreements**
